
Ecosystem Services Framework



"Ecosystem services" represent the human benefits that healthy ecosystems provide, including water purification, flood protection, and recreational opportunities. To better understand these services, officials and resource managers need a framework that integrates four key elements: biophysical science, human benefits, stakeholder engagement, and communication.

Use this questionnaire to explore these four elements and how integrated they are in your ecosystem services project. The questions are designed to assess whether the ecosystem services framework is right for you, as well as help you prepare for the planning process. While this quick reference is no substitute for a comprehensive guide, describing your management issue and completing the early assessment checklist provides a preliminary assessment to steer projects toward the right path.

A comprehensive ecosystem services project integrates the four components, but any combination can be incorporated into projects. For some questions, the answers may be uncovered as the project progresses. If your response to any of the checklist questions is "no" or "unsure," you may need additional reflection or planning.



What's Your Issue?

Clearly defining the management issue (or question) is an important first step when starting an ecosystem services project. Complete the following questions to help define the issue, desired outcomes, and potential stakeholders, which can include beneficiaries and users of this information.

What is your management question or issue?
Example: When are living shorelines optimal for use, for both individuals and the environment? What are the
costs and benefits of living shorelines?
What are the desired outcomes of this work?
Example: Managers, decision-makers, and property owners making informed decisions based on the best
available science on living shorelines. This may include estimates for costs of implementation as well as costs
avoided.
Who might benefit from or use this information?
Example: land owners, planners, engineers, developers
